Surgeons' Hall is an integral part of Edinburgh's World Heritage Site. With heritage listed buildings and museum, library, and archive collections dating back to 1460, it is a unique, internationally significant resource providing enjoyment and education across a range of audiences both onsite and online.

Surgeons' Hall is amongst Scotland's oldest museums and houses one of the largest and most important collections of surgical pathology in the world.

With interactive exhibits on the practice of surgery, and regular school and outreach programmes, we create a space of curiosity to inspire the next generation of surgeons.

Professor Stephen MacLeod

Professor Stephen MacLeod is an Oral and Maxillofacial surgeon based at Loyola University, who was elected as an RCSEd Fellow by examination in 1999.

Professor MacLeod has pledged a gift in his Will to The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh to establish a new prestigious medal. Here, he shares why he chose to leave a gift to the College.

I chose Edinburgh as my college for the simple reason that it was home. I was born in the States and came to Edinburgh as a young boy, attending school and growing up in the city. I have memories of getting the number 29 bus from Stockbridge, and one of the stops on the route being Surgeons' Hall. My late aunt Muriel brought me up and she was very involved with organised nursing. She had worked closely with several members of the College and was the scrub nurse for notable Fellows such as Sir John Bruce and Norman Dott. Over the years I became enamoured with the College, knowing what it had done historically and how it was included within the local consciousness. When I became old enough to come and do exams for myself, I found the environment of the College respectful

and welcoming, and that is something that has resonated with me for the whole of my career. I have fellowships from the other Colleges, but I very much view Edinburgh as my home.

I chose to leave a gift to the College for several reasons. The College was very good to me and for many ways has defined my professional life and thus by extension my personal life, with colleagues and friends that I've known for over 40 years.

I've got a long history with the College so remembering and acknowledging this relationship is important. The idea of giving it in the name or in the memory of someone helps that person's memory live on. When you look at the College diploma ceremonies and you see the various medals being awarded it harkens you back to another day and makes you realise what a wonderfully long pedigree you're in touch with.

The College's motto is *From Here, Health*, and it's lived by that for the last 500 years. I look forward to the College doing that for another 500. I'm sorry I won't be around to see it, but I hope my legacy can play a part.

Global CARE

Global CARE (Creating Access to Resources and Education) exists to address healthcare inequality worldwide by building sustainable surgical and dental capacity in communities suffering from chronic shortages of care.

Over five billion people globally do not have access to safe and affordable surgery, with access being worst in low-income and lower-middle-income countries where nine out of ten people cannot access basic surgery (The Lancet).

There has been remarkable progress in global health development in recent years, but there is still work to be done to ensure that those living in resource-poor communities have access to timely, affordable, and safe surgical care.

Global CARE was developed in response to increasing demand from our Members and Fellows operating globally for targeted, flexible funding that can respond quickly to local priorities in surgical education, access, and care.

Through strategic partnerships and targeted initiatives, we ensure our projects create sustainable, long-lasting, and widespread impact. We do this by facilitating a grant programme for healthcare practitioners working in-country.

A gift in your Will to Global CARE will widen access to surgical training, advance health equity, and foster sustainable development through international collaboration.





Could fund a **Small Project Grant**, delivering short term surgical training and piloting projects.



Could fund a **Large Project Grant**, strengthening local surgical systems.



Could fund a **Global CARE Scholarship**, enabling healthcare professionals from underserved countries to gain essential surgical and dental skills currently unavailable in their regions.

Creating Your Legacy

In creating your Will, naturally your first consideration will be taking care of your family and loved ones. After you have done so, you may wish to leave a remainder of your estate as a gift to *The Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh*.

If you are considering including us as a beneficiary in your Will, we advise that you consult with your solicitor to ensure that your instructions are properly interpreted and that your Will is valid.

The College is at the centre of surgical policy and practice, so you can be certain that your legacy will have optimum effectiveness in an area of your choice. Whatever your choice, your legacy will support the principle that has guided the College throughout its existence: the advancement of surgical standards to deliver better outcomes for patients.

You may wish to leave an unrestricted gift to be used at the discretion of the College, which will allow us to use your donation where it is needed the most. If you wish to support a specific activity, we recommend that you discuss your ideas with the College to ensure that we are able to fulfil your wishes.

There are various ways that you can leave a gift in your Will, including:

A Pecuniary Legacy

a simple gift of a stated amount of money

A Residuary Legacy

all, or a percentage of, the estate that remains is gifted, after all debts have been paid and other gifts made

Life Interest

the beneficiary, possibly a relative, has the use of the gift during their lifetime, for instance a house. After their death, it passes to a nominated beneficiary which could be a charity

Specific Gifts

particular identified items are gifted, for example a collection of books bequeathed to our Library

A Will ensures that your assets are distributed as per your wishes, meaning that your family and loved ones have clarity over what you would like them to receive. There are potential tax benefits and other advantages that result from effective succession planning, and we would recommend that you seek professional advice.
